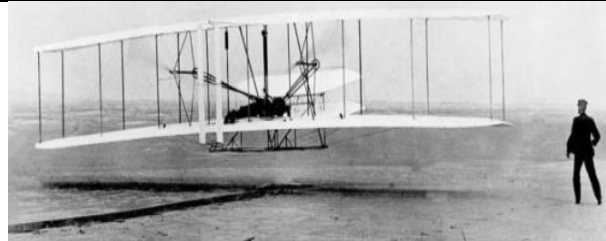


Did you know?

In some parts of the world, people still travel mostly by walking or riding animals, such as donkeys, horses and camels.

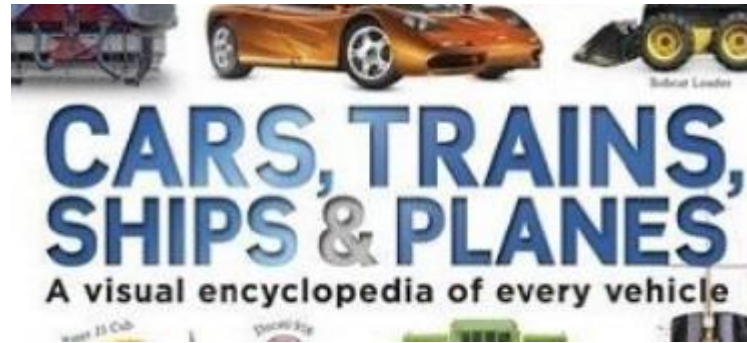


Orville and Wilbur Wright are commonly referred to as the Wright Brothers. They are credited with the first successful airplane design and flight.

There are three main kinds of transportation: by land, water and air.

Samuel Franklin Cody is recognised as being the first person in Britain to fly a heavier than air machine. He managed to fly a distance of 420m on the 16th October 1908.

Key Vocabulary

Transport	A vehicle used to convey objects or people from one place to another. Or the act of moving people or objects from one place to another.
Vehicle	Something used to transport persons or good e.g. a train
Travel	To journey from one place to another.
Mode	A form or manner – how something is done.
Ship	A large sea going boat.
Locomotive	An engine that moves under its own power.
Train	A connected line of railroad cars.
Bicycle	A light vehicle with two wheels behind one another, handle bars, a saddle seat and pedals by which it is made to move.
Double Decker Bus	A bus that has two storeys or decks.
Hyperloop	A pod is transported via a vacuum sealed tube.
Vapour	Fine particles of matter floating in the air and clouding it.
Steam	The invisible vapour into which water is changed when heated
Resistance	An opposing slowing force.
